SUMMARY

Young people that participate in civic life are less likely to smoke, abuse drugs and alcohol, and drop out of school.¹ Moreover, localities with civically engaged citizens have lower crime rates, as well as greater economic prosperity, better-educated youth, and more effective governments.² While there are civic engagement programs for young people in Clinton, they need improvement. Clinton could benefit substantially from both the redesign of current efforts and the introduction of new civic engagement programs within the community.

BACKGROUND

Youth civic engagement can be broken down into four categories:

- 1. civic action (participation in activities such as volunteering or service-learning)
- 2. civic commitment (the willingness to make positive contributions to society)
- 3. civic skills (the ability to be involved in civil society, politics, and democracy)
- 4. social cohesion (a sense of reciprocity, trust, and bonding to others).³

Individual benefits of civic engagement include:

- improved academic performance
- increased social-emotional wellbeing
- economic mobility.⁴

Youth civic engagement is crucial to the continuation of a well-functioning community, however, Clinton has few opportunities for youth to be civically engaged. Moreover, like many small communities, Clinton has a lack of data surrounding the issue, making it difficult to quantify the exposure that youth have to civic engagement education and programs.

CURRENT EFFORTS AND FUNDING

Extracurricular activities and classroom curriculum currently constitute the bulk of Clinton's youth civic engagement efforts. They include:

1. Mayors Youth Commission

The MYC challenges students to learn about city functions by attending city council meetings and engaging with the community. Students must apply to become a member of the MYC, which currently has 11 members.

2. Synergy Clinton

Synergy is made up of students and faculty from Clinton High School who work on initiatives to improve their community. Synergy allows students to receive academic credit for Iowa Core Standards that are essential for graduating.⁵

3. High School Curriculum

Clinton High School has both required and elective curriculum that civically educates students. This includes required classes, such as American Government or AP American Government, as well as an optional class, Contemporary U.S. Issues.⁶ While Contemporary U.S. Issues offers more information concerning civic engagement than the required courses, the course does not offer direct ways for students to engage with their community.

Funding is somewhat scarce for civic engagement efforts within the community. Currently, civic organizations in Clinton receive money or can receive money through two main organizations: Clinton County 4-H Endowment Fund, a non-profit organization that works to provide financial resources for youth development through 4-H,⁷ and the Clinton County Development Association, which provides financial assistance through their grant program for local educational, social, cultural, and environmental programs, as well as up to \$25,000 in scholarships for involved Clinton High School students.⁸

POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Undergo Data Collection

In order to quantify the experience and exposure that Clinton High School students have to civic engagement, we recommend administering a student survey. We have drafted two survey options, one online and one on paper. Responses will be anonymous, and will ask students a variety of questions to assess their experience with civic engagement and their desire to be civically engaged. The survey will be administered by Clinton High School teachers during homeroom time. This survey will address the need for critical data within the community. Furthermore, it will quantify the civic engagement issue by determining where students are civically engaged, as well as which components of civic engagement are most in need of improvement.

2. Redesign of the Mayor's Youth Council

There are several steps to this recommendation:

- Teachers should nominate students to the MYC to increase its size and diversity. Increasing the size of the MYC from 11 students to 20 would be ideal to represent diverse ideas and experiences. Through the nomination process, the goal would be to increase awareness of the program by encouraging participation by students who were not previously interested in applying, as well as those who were not nominated. The number of nominations is up to teacher discretion, but the goal should be to nominate a diverse group of students who will make the MYC representative of both the school and the community.
- Establish specific goals and bylaws for the program. Setting clear goals will help to measure success and visualize the outcomes of the MYC. Developing bylaws will help the organization solidify its purpose, as well as include practical, day-to-day details of how the MYC will run.
- Develop specialized committees for students within the MYC to serve on. Within these committees, students can focus on issues of importance to them and increase community awareness of these issues.
- Update the MYC Website. The Mayor's Youth Commission in Tacoma, Washington is a good example.⁹ The website should introduce the members of the MYC, discusses its goals, provide a portfolio of past work, and simplify communication by providing a point of contact for the program. Along with a redesigned website, the MYC will also benefit from the creation of social media pages. Having an updated website would streamline this transition to social media and provide readily available content for the MYC to post. Hopefully this content will attract interest from the community.

3. Increase Volunteer Opportunities

Clinton should implement the following three steps to increase volunteering opportunities:

- 1. educate students on why civic engagement is vital to them and where they live
- 2. encourage students to utilize social media to share the importance of volunteering
- 3. organize projects for students to engage with.

Furthermore, Clinton could use Martin Luther King Jr. Day as a starting point for promoting volunteering since it is a day dedicated to service. Students cannot be mandated to volunteer on MLK day; however, both the MYC and Clinton High School could encourage students to do so by offering volunteer opportunities and reminding students why it is a day off.

BEST PRACTICES

Similar steps have been taken in other communities that have proven to be effective in challenging youth to be civically engaged, showing that tangible change is possible for Clinton. Examples of successful civic engagement initiatives in other communities include:

- 1. Voter education programs, such as "Hawk the Vote" at the University of Iowa, which helps to assist college students with the voting process.¹⁰
- 2. Academic reward systems that would incentivize schools to civically educate students. The California Department of Education provides funding and awards to schools with high civic engagement rates.¹¹
- 3. Individual empowerment programs that work to support minority communities and all students regardless of socio-economic background. Successful individual empowerment programs exist in Des Moines Public Schools, such as Al Éxito, which seeks to motivate and prepare Latinx students for post-high school education, economic security, and civic engagement.¹²

CONCLUSION

Clinton has the potential to create a positive culture where youth are civically engaged. Through this comprehensive plan that incorporates data collection, redesigning the Mayor's Youth Commission, and increased volunteer opportunities, civic engagement can become the norm for Clinton youth.
