Since the pandemic, truancy has become an increasingly serious and visible problem nationwide, and Dubuque is not alone: more than 30% of its K-12 students experience chronic absenteeism. For Pacific Islander students the rate is closer to 78%.

As part of IISC's 2023-24 partnership with the City of Dubuque, three UI students from the **Community** Empowerment Law Project (CELP) spent spring semester collecting and synthesizing information and creating a formal structure for action. Mason Koelm, Parker Ballard, and Fotini Marut accelerated a project started by the **Community Foundation of** Greater Dubuque (CFGD). Along the way, they gained an appreciation for future work they might undertake in Iowa. "[Because of this project] I feel like I don't have to go to Chicago or a city," said Parker Ballard (JD, 24) "There's a community right here that is doing work I'm interested in."

community's population was approximately 4,000 residents, as compared to today's estimated--and still quickly growing--population of 10,000. The students looked at the effects of parks on health and wellness, the importance of small neighborhood parks, and how to make parks inviting to all.

A key learning takeaway from the team was the significance of greenways. Melanie Comer (URP, 24), says, "Greenways are areas of green space that act as natural pathways for transportation not just for humans but also for bio-diversity. Greenways can be used not just for transportation, but also as areas for environmental preservation and protection of natural resources."

City Administrator Marketa Oliver thanked the students for presenting work on par with other plans the quickly growing city has recently received from professional firms; she promised that their work would be quickly put into effect.

generation Hawkeye and community college transfer, Petersen is an online student earning a bachelor's degree in political science while working full-time as communication director for the state auditor—all from the small farm in rural Audubon County where he lives with his husband, Luke.

Petersen recently became one of 60 college juniors to win a **Truman Scholarship** this year. He becomes one of 15 UI students to have earned the award, which is widely regarded as the premier graduate scholarship for aspiring public service leaders in the U.S., since the program began in 1977.

Petersen hopes to earn a master's degree in urban and regional planning and says IISC is a major attractor to the UI's program. Jennifer New, IISC's public engagement specialist, served on an interview-preparation committee to ready Petersen for the rigorous Truman process.
