Liberty Square project comes to culmination

Entering the city of Clinton from the west on Highway 30, one drives through an industrial section that is home to such economic anchors as Archer Daniels Midland (ADM). At one point, the road splits and an island of land exists between the multi-directional road. It is easy to miss since currently it's undeveloped. The challenge put forth by the City to UI students was to consider a new life for this area.

After nearly two decades without any significant development, Clinton city officials want to evaluate previous land use plans and ordinances to encourage new uses and investment on the property. They asked IISC students to provide ideas for revitalizing the area known as Liberty Square.

In March, the students presented four concepts that included a design element known as a Persian square, fountains, and solar panel trees. "I've lived here all my life, and the great questions from the students made me take a second look at how I was perceiving things," **Karen Rowan**, Clinton's city planner, said of their ideas. At **the May 4 event**, the group will unveil their final plan.

Creative, Equitable Placemaking
Students in planning and public affairs and
the arts team up

Walking through an alley between Linn and North Dubuque Streets, a group of University of Iowa students stop to gaze at a mural that wraps around the backside of a building. **Ella Hink**, a fourth-year environmental engineering student, comes forward to describe the piece. Hink and her classmates are on a walking tour of public art in downtown Iowa City that is part of a class focused on the role of creativity and the arts in placemaking.

It is likely one of the most cross-disciplinary classes on campus, in part because it's actually two courses that choose to meet at the same time and share space and assignments. **Travis Kraus** teaches "Community Development through Creative Placemaking" in the School of Planning and Public Affairs, while **Loyce Arthur** teaches "Action! Engage! Art! Creative Placemaking for the Public Good" in the Department of Theatre Arts. In past years, the classes focused on Black businesses, creating a story map. This year, they are partnering with the newly formed Wonderful Westside Neighborhood.
